Grade	Course	Type	Prerequisite	Course Details
9	CGC1DI Issues in Canadian Geography	Academic		Using a variety of frameworks including natural, human, economic and global, we explore the distinct and evolving character of Canada. Communication skills in different formats are developed.
9	CGC1PI Issues in Canadian Geography	Applied		Drawing on everyday experiences, we explore the diversity of Canada by looking at the reasons this country works so well and why there are problems to be solved. Human, natural and economic activities are the main areas of study.

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10	CHC2DI Canadian History since World War I	Academic		This course explores social, economic, and political developments and events and their impact on the lives of different groups in Canada since 1914. Students will examine the role of conflict and cooperation in Canadian society, Canada's evolving role within the global community, and the impact of various individuals, organizations, and events on Canadian identity, citizenship, and heritage. They will develop their ability to apply the concepts of historical thinking and the historical inquiry process, including the interpretation and analysis of evidence, when investigating key issues and events in Canadian history since 1914.
10	CHC2PI Canadian History since World War I	Applied		This course focuses on the social context of historical developments and events and how they have affected the lives of people in Canada since 1914. Students will explore interactions between various communities in Canada as well as contributions of individuals and groups to Canadian heritage and identity. Students will develop their ability to apply the concepts of historical thinking and the historical inquiry process, including the interpretation and analysis of evidence, when investigating the continuing relevance of historical developments and how they have helped shape communities in present-day Canada.
10	CHV2OH Civics and Citizenship	Open		This course explores the role of politics in people's lives and the importance of being an active citizen in a democratic society. Students will examine the ways in which individuals and groups participate in the political process, the ways in which they can influence political decision making and public policy, and the effectiveness of political systems and institutions in meeting societal needs. Students will apply inquiry and communication skills to analyze and report on political issues, events, and trends of interest to them. This is a 0.5 credit course.

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11	CGF3MI Forces of Nature:	University/ College	CGC1DI or CGC1PI	Planet Earth – the forces of creation and destruction constantly reshape the third rock from the sun. A wide range of geographic tools and methods are used to explore the ongoing evolution of the physical environment. An extended field study is offered as part of this course. Students will be offered a Killarney Provincial Park geologic study and canoe trip.
11	CGF3MW Forces of Nature	Enhanced	CGC1DW	Recommendation of grade 9 Geography teacher required.
11	CGG3OI Travel and Tourism A Geographic Perspective	Open	CGG1DI or CGC1PI	With a focus on travel and tourism, we examine the unique characteristics of selected world regions such as New York, Florida, Europe, the Caribbean and Southeast Asia. Exploration of natural environments, economies, cultures and interaction of world regions takes you around the world in a virtual tour. This course is offering a trip to France.
11	CHW3MI World History to the end of the 15th Century	University/ College	CHC2DI or CHC2PI	This course investigates the history of humanity from earliest times to the sixteenth century. Students will analyze diverse societies from around the world. Topics include: Evolution, Creation, Pyramids, Atlantis, The Trojan War, 300 Spartans, Castles, Samurai Warriors and Witchcraft. Students will also analyze the historical accuracy of films like "Troy", "Gladiator", and "Kingdom of Heaven".
11	CHG33I Crimes Against Humanity: Historical and Contemporary Implications	University/ College	CHC2DI or CHC2PI	This course investigates examples of genocide in the Twentieth and Twenty-first Centuries, including the Holocaust, Armenia, and Rwanda. Students will investigate the terms genocide, crimes against humanity, and war crimes and explore them through the lens of historical analysis. Students will examine identity formation and how "in groups" and "out groups" are created, including an analysis of how bias, stereotypes, prejudice, and discrimination impact on various groups. Throughout the course, students will gain

				an understanding of the role of perpetrator, victim, bystander, rescuer, opportunist, and resistor. As the course unfolds students will be challenged to draw appropriate connections between the history of genocide and Canadian history.
11	CLU3MI Canadian Law	University/ College	CHC2DI or CHC2PI	This course explores Canadian Law focusing on legal issues that are relevant to the lives of people in Canada. Students will gain an understanding of laws relating to rights and freedoms in Canada, our legal system, civil law, and criminal law. Includes a trip to Superior Court and a Mock Trial where students put course curriculum into practice.

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12	CGR4MI Environment and Resource Management	University/ College	Any 'U, M or C' course in Canadian and World Stu.,, English or Social Sciences	This course will include practical activities to study resource management topics such as forestry, endangered species, freshwater, park systems, atmospheric pollution, agriculture and more. Fieldwork is an important course component. Many classroom experiences are planned in an outdoor setting including a Grand River canoe trip and river study, woodlot surveys, and agricultural visits. Students also have options of attending a winter dog sledding trip to Algonquin Park.
12	CGW4UI World Issues: A Geographic Analysis	University	Any 'U or M' course in Canadian and World Stu.,, English or Social Sciences	This course will develop your appreciation for the global perspective of our contemporary world. Featuring a great variety of current topics, we explore using interactive and innovative simulations, debates and explorations. Independent and lateral thinking are encouraged as a way of enhancing your appreciation of world issues.
12	CHY4UI World History since the 15 th Century	University	Any 'U or M' course in Canadian and World Studies, English or Social Sciences	Students will investigate the major philosophical, social, military, philosophical and scientific trends in Western Civilization and world history, including an examination of the interaction between the emerging West and other regions of the world. Key events include the Renaissance, the French Revolution, Napoleon, the rise of Communism and Fascism, European imperialism in Africa and Asia, and a major unit on the Holocaust.
12	CHM4EI Adventures in World History	Workplace	CHC2DI or CHC2PI	This course examines a variety of human experiences in world history from earliest times to the present. Topics include Vikings, witches, slavery, medieval castles, and 1920s gangsters. Opportunities will be given to develop historical awareness, as well as their analytical and communication skills.
12	CIA4UI Analyzing Current Economic Issues	University	Any 'U or M' course in Canadian and World Studies, English or Social Sciences	This course explores a variety of micro- and macro-economic concepts and theories. Students will apply the concepts of economic thinking and the economic inquiry process as well as economic models and theories to investigate and develop informed opinions about economic trade-offs, growth, sustainability as well as other related economic issues. Advanced Standing Dual Credits are courses that have secondary school curriculum aligned with specified university courses. Read details on the WRDSB Website . A student may earn a half credit in Microeconomics if they are accepted at Wilfrid Laurier University.
12	CLN4UI Canadian and International Law	University	Any 'U or M' course in Canadian and World Studies, English or Social Sciences	This course explores a range of contemporary legal issues and how they are addressed in both Canadian and International law. Students will develop an understanding of the principles of Canadian and International law and of issues related to human rights and freedoms, conflicts, forensic evidence, terrorism and a focus on criminal law. Includes a trip to Superior Court in Kitchener.
