## Agenda item: Students as Writers Project Proposal Presenter: Taru and Andrew Cairns

- There was a presentation given on the proposal. There was a brief discussion about the proposal how students are going to write the books in dual languages.
- This is going to be run like a class project where all the students individually or in pairs will be creating fiction or non-fiction text based on their cultural heritage or their own stories.
- Parent Volunteer involvement is to be planned for the corrections in the first languages is recommended as one parent had an experience with students using Google translator for the language translation.
- Student should know how to speak or write to choose the language.
- This is going to be a pilot project for the whole next academic year starting from Fall, target is to complete the printing and give the books to students by May.
- Each book is printed 3 copies, one for student, class and school libraries.
- Some of the benefits from the project were presented and requested for an amount of 360\$ for this pilot project.
- Council voted on the item (85.7% YES; 14.3% NO) and approved the amount and it should be updated in the treasurer report.
- There was suggestion to let know about the project to all the students to create interest in other students.

### Questions raised at the meeting:

1. How is the class chosen for this project? Were only two languages selected from many languages spoken in the class? What are the criteria in choosing this class?

For this pilot project a French immersion class is selected, as all the students in the class knows both the languages. So, it can be for the entire class.

2. What is the future planning for the funds if more requests or more classes are joining?

After pilot they are planning for applying a board level funding for this type of projects through Parents Involving committee as more parent volunteer involvement needed to actual corrections of the language.

3. What was the previous project about?

Prior to this the books are for junior students with first language and English.

- There was an update given about the applied PRO Grant amount, that the grant was approved for full amount i.e., \$1200/-.
- There is a cost of \$280/- travel fees for the 7 scientists arriving for the MAD Science event to be held on May 31<sup>st</sup>. As school council agreed to fill-in the cost gaps for the event, the amount of \$280/- is considered an approved expense.
- A total of \$1480/- is to be spent for the MAD Science event and \$1200/- will be reimbursed after the PRO grant is received.

## Principal's Report for School Council Wednesday, May 17th, 2023

## <u>School</u>

- In partnership with Student Transportation Services of Waterloo Region (STSWR), we will be having a "bike to school week" from May 29<sup>th</sup> to June 2<sup>nd</sup>. We will be doing daily announcements to encourage students to ride their bikes to school and doing a "count" of bikes in the racks to submit to STSWR for a chance to win a prize for our school (a new bike rack).
- Next year, we will be making a small change to our daily schedule. School start and end times will remain the same (9:10 a.m. and 3:30 p.m.) We will be having 4 periods of instruction, followed by 1<sup>st</sup> NB, followed by another 4 periods of instruction, followed by 2<sup>nd</sup> NB, followed by 2 periods of instruction at the end of the day. Currently, we are following a 4-3-3 model. The rationale behind this is to increase the instructional blocks when students are at their freshest and best able to learn. It will also create the opportunity for more double periods of instruction. This will shift the time of our second nutrition break to 1:50 2:30 (currently it is 1:20 2:00). Our website will be updated accordingly.
- Our Art Show and Book Swap on April 27<sup>th</sup> was a huge success! The event was very well attended and lots of positive feedback was received. Personally, I think this would be an excellent even to run on a yearly basis.
- We will be having a Jump Rope for Heart event day on June 19<sup>th</sup> where all students will participate in a variety of fun activities, including skipping during the second block of the day. On May 26<sup>th</sup>, we will be having a Jump Rope for Heart assembly for all the students to talk about the event and the option of students being able to do some fundraising for the Heart and Stroke Foundation. Donations will be accepted online and also in cash for any families interested in participating in the fundraising portion of this event.
- This is a very busy time of year with many events on the horizon. Our Volunteer Breakfast is being held the morning of May 25<sup>th</sup> in our library from 8 – 9 a.m. Our Kindergarten Open House is the evening of June 12<sup>th</sup> from 6 – 7 p.m. Our Junior Track and Field meet will be held on May 30<sup>th</sup> and the Regional Track and Field meet is at Jacob Hespeler Secondary School on June 21<sup>st</sup>. All of our grade 3 and 6 students will be participating in EQAO testing the week of June 5<sup>th</sup> – June 9<sup>th</sup>. Grades 6s are going to Camp Ki-way on May 18<sup>th</sup> and 19<sup>th</sup> and will also be visiting Laurelwood PS on Jun 19<sup>th</sup> for an orientation.

#### <u>Board</u>

- Two of our WRDSB elementary school have now officially been renamed. Ryerson PS in Cambridge is now called Blue Heron PS. A.R. Kaufman PS in Kitchener is now called Hillside PS. The school renaming process is a part of our commitment to making concrete changes in support of the Calls to Action outlined by the Truth and Reconciliation Commission. The WRDSB began the renaming process for both schools in early 2023. The work was led by School Renaming Committees, made up of trustees, school staff, board staff, parents & caregivers, students, community members, Indigenous community members and representatives from community organizations.
- The Waterloo Educational Foundation Incorporated (WEFI) has renewed their commitment to funding local organizations that support student nutrition programs. The WEFI Board of Directors passed a motion to provide \$30,000 to be distributed equally to our community partners <u>Food4Kids Waterloo Region</u>, the <u>May Court Club of</u> <u>Kitchener-Waterloo</u> and <u>Nutrition for Learning</u>.
- Two WRDSB trustee positions are now vacant. Sadly, Trustee Fred Meissner passed away suddenly last week. All our school flags will be flying at half-mast until the day of his funeral. Trustee Marie Snyder has also recently resigned her position due to health reasons.

#### **Province**

 The Ministry of Education has recently announced that they will be updating the Grade 10 Career Studies curriculum to include mental health literacy and is introducing mandatory resources for teachers and students on mental health literacy in Grades 7 and 8. The Ministry will also be providing funding to further students' access to schoolbased mental health professional and services year round, along with helping Boards meet local needs and priorities related to mental health, including professional development, student engagement, wellness promotion. We will have to wait for more details on what this will look like for us in the WRDSB.
