Principal's Update

- We currently are 272 students strong and have 13 classes. Our size is a great advantage as we can get to know each of our Alligators.
- Thanks to council for arranging coffee on the first day of school. Parents and guardians appreciated the warm welcome and warm beverage that you provided.
- Overall, the beginning of the school year has been very smooth. All of our kindergarten students began on day 1 this year and our Alpine staff did an amazing job of keeping everyone safe, happy and learning.
- In the 7 classes using **agendas**, 20% of our students have not paid despite 2 reminders. This creates a cost to the school which takes away from other areas of need.
- Leadership opportunities for our students are getting underway: morning announcers, office helpers, PALS leaders, and lunchroom helpers are all up and running.
- We are pleased to have YMCA's SHYFT program again for a group of 10 of our junior students. SHYFT (Shaping and Helping Youth Form Tomorrow) is a 12-week program available to all youth between the ages of 8 to 12. The program is rooted in our confidence that youth have the ability to change the world around them. By providing an opportunity for discussion and action and allowing youth to foster critical thinking, outlets are created for valuable change to occur both within themselves and their communities. Through art-based activities such as graffiti, videos, magazines, and button and poster campaigns youth have been able to amplify their voice to share their message.
- After-school ArtShine programming is once again being offered. ArtShine
 provides 2 scholarships and we have had 7 requests from families for this
 opportunity for our students. A draw has been made and families notified.
- Alpine Alligators will continue to focus on developing hope, efficacy, resilience, optimism, gratitude, empathy and mindfulness for a second year. At our recent PD day, staff identified how we will try to develop these attributes in ourselves, our immediate students, across our school and in our broader community. (We will not be working with Plasticity this year, so we can not call ourselves a HERO school.) While these attributes seem simple, developing them in ourselves and our students is truly complex work. We are finding that even as adults we have much room for developing our understanding and personal growth.

- One of the junior division strategies to foster growth of these attributes is to invite guest speakers to inspire our students. Our first guest speaker, David Carroll, ultra runner and author, reinforced hope, optimism, resilience, and efficacy for our grades 3-6 Alligators on September 23. He shared that he did two "impossible" things ran a 100 mile race and wrote a book (he described himself as a "meh" student). He challenged each of us to not listen to the voice in our brain that tells us we can't do something, we are not good enough, or to quit. He was very impressed with our lovely new playground and intrigued by the GaGa Ball pit! Thanks to Mrs. W-G for arranging this opportunity.
- WRDSB has purchased 25 Lexia licenses for our students and we have also purchased a few more to support students in developing literacy skills. We are grateful for the financial support from WRDSB.
- All grades 1-6 students will be using **DreamBox** again. Our teachers
 unanimously requested this as we feel it is having a very positive impact on
 student outcomes in Math. DreamBox is just one part of the comprehensive
 math programs we are striving to deliver.
- Terry Fox run is coming up this Friday. Our goal is to raise \$1200.
- Alpine's EQAO scores continue to show that our Alligators are capable of achieving at provincial standards ((75%). Our scores are generally trending upwards and Alligators are performing better than the average in WRDSB and Ontario where results are flatlining or decreasing slightly. This is a good trend for us to challenge! We are very proud of our Alligators and our staff for all of their hard work! In a small school, variation in scores is expected from year to year as each student group is different. This year, our focus is on improving math scores in grade 6 especially and preparing our grade 5 students to perform much better in grade 6 than they did in grade 3. ISR or Individual Student Reports for the students who wrote EQAO last year will be sent home to parents in the next few weeks.
