- Math teachers have been working in learning groups focused on comprehensive math/literacy approaches with support from Learning Services consultants to explore using small group instruction to address gaps in foundational concept. Phase 2 gap intervention to work with students identified as missing some foundations in math and reading. Math will focus on fractions and reading with focus on paragraph writing and summarizing.

A key finding from that report indicated that students want help to recognize signs of mental health problems, and knowledge on how and where to seek help for oneself or a friend. Accordingly, this new student resource includes the following:

- self-care tips
- reflective questions to help young people recognize that they may need some help through struggles
- where to go for help
- conversation starters
