# **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

In this course, students will address the challenge of creating a more sustainable and equitable world. Students will explore issues involving a wide range of topics, including economic disparities, threats to the environment, globalization, human rights, and quality of life, and will analyze government policies, international agreements, and individual responsibilities relating to them. Students will apply the concepts of geographic thinking and the geographic inquiry process, including the use of spatial technologies, to investigate these complex issues and their impacts on natural and human communities around the world.

\*This course deals with some mature matter as relevant issues are analyzed.

**Prerequisite:** Any university or university/college preparation course in Canadian and world studies, English, or social sciences and humanities

**Essential Learning/Expectations/Skills -** To be successful in this course, students <u>must</u> be able to demonstrate <u>all</u> of the following essential learning tasks. Essential learnings include:

- 1. Developing geographic inquiry skills and thinking while investigating world issues
- 2. Demonstrating the ability to identify, analyze and frame current world issues that have environmental, social, political and/or economic implications.
- 3. Communicating and interpreting geographical information and data while analyzing and suggesting logical and complex solutions that address issues of concern.

#### **PROCEDURES**

**Late and Missing Assignments:** It is important for students to develop good personal management skills (such as time management and planning). These skills will be reflected in the learning skills area of the report card. It is expected that students will complete and submit all essential tasks as they are the opportunity for you to demonstrate your learning to your teacher.
