
ENG 4UI Novel Study—Locating Quality Secondary Sources

Here are some suggestions on how to find suitable secondary sources to your ISU novel. You will need to know what other experts and writers have published about your book. Ideally, these secondary sources should support your novel's themes and potential essay's thesis

A reliable place to find scholarly, peer-reviewed secondary sources is in the <u>Virtual Library</u>. Here are three databases useful for senior-level analyses:




*Gale Online Resources→Select the Database, Literature Resource Center




This collection will not only provide the articles, reviews and materials, but will give you the MLA citation for your selections.


When looking for articles, <u>place quotation marks around the book title and author's name</u> as this will keep the words together in the search. Narrow your search to select Peer Reviewed Publications. When you find a desired article, you can add it to your Google Drive.




*EBSCOhost Secondary houses two excellent databases: Literary Reference Center Plus and Advanced Placement Source. You can add found articles to your Google Drive.



*EBSCO Search EXPLORA has many excellent features. Search the "Arts and Literature" collection for both author and novel details. Send your found articles to Google Drive.

ARTEMIS Literary Sources – search by placing quotation marks around the title of your book

This excellent resource not only provides chapter summaries and character descriptions, but thematic analyses and criticisms. Type the title of your novel in the search bar. The actual book-in-hand encyclopedia set is available to you as well.
