What's Happening?

Recently, there have been 8 confirmed **cases of measles** in Toronto, Niagara and York Region. There is considerable measles activity occurring in the United States. Between January 1st to February 6th, there were 121 cases from 17 states.

- Most cases have been unvaccinated
- To date, there have been no cases of measles in Waterloo Region

Why does this matter?

- Measles infection can lead to serious complications including
 - o pneumonia
 - o swelling of the brain (encephalitis) and
 - o death (in rare cases)
- Measles is a **highly contagious** infection and you can get it by just being in the same room as someone with measles.

How to Prevent Measles?

- Vaccination is close to 100% effective in preventing measles
- Vaccinations needed:
 - Children: one vaccine dose (MMR) at 12 months of age, and a second dose at 4-6 years of age
 - Adults born in 1970 or later: at least 1 dose of measles vaccine and preferably 2 doses
 - Adults born between 1967and 1970 may have received an older vaccine and require a dose of the current vaccine
 - Adults born before 1970 who didn't receive any vaccine are assumed to have had measles and considered immune; they don't need vaccination

Ongoing key messages:

- Please check that you and your family have had 2 doses of measles vaccine (MMR), or contact your health care provider
