Reminders:

- Families are encouraged to continue to use the online <u>School Screening Tool</u> that is posted on our website prior to sending their child(ren) to school each day. If your child is feeling ill, please keep them home until their symptoms improve for 24 hours, if vomiting, they need to be symptom free for 48 hours.
- The parking lot remains closed during drop off and pick up times. The bus loop is also not available for parent use during these times. The "Kiss and Drop" zone is at the side of the road in front of the Lexington School Sign. Parents can quickly drop their students off there and let their children walk to their assigned area in the morning.
- Check with your child(ren) that they have indoor footwear that fits. We often find students are starting to
 grow out of their footwear at this time of year.
- Ensure your child remembers to bring a water bottle each and every day. We have water bottle filling
 stations available for all to use throughout the day. Our fountains are available for use, however, we
 continue to encourage students to use their own water bottles and fill them regularly to prevent the
 spreading of germs.

Character Education: Empathy

During the months of March and April, students will be learning about Empathy. Empathy is the ability to be aware of the feelings of others and imagine what it might be like to be in their position (or in their shoes). It is a key ingredient in positive friendships and relationships. It reduces conflict and misunderstandings and leads to helping behavior, kindness, and even greater success in life in general. Here are some simple activities you can try at home to encourage empathy:

- 1. Talk openly about emotions at home. Label them and ask why they feel the way they do. Model this as well when you, as a parent are feeling different emotions.
- 2. When reading stories, ask your child about how the characters in the stories feel and why.
- 3. Create an Empathy Map. Choose an emotion, and then brainstorm what you might think, say or do when you feel that way.
- 4. Involve your child with volunteering opportunities and as they get older encourage them to volunteer on their own.
- 5. Teach and embrace diversity. Talk about commonalities and differences. With older students, discuss current events and points of view.


























