I know that class placement for the 2023-24 School Year is beginning to come to everyone's minds. Please understand that teachers, educators and staff members work very closely together to make decisions for students that best support their academic, social, and emotional needs. While many parents are concerned for their own children and want to advocate, please also understand that we have to consider what is best for all students at Lexington P.S. Decisions about teacher assignments will not be shared until September, as these assignments are tentative and can change up to the end of September 2023. When placing students, we also work hard to ensure students have at least one familiar person in their class as a friend. Therefore, we ask families to trust our educators and staff to use their best judgment when placing their child for next year.

That being said, sometimes there are situations that have occurred in the past that the teachers/educators and/or principal are not aware of. If this is the case, I ask that you send me a personal email to let me know of the situation at barb_tomkins@wrdsb.ca. Please understand that this information will remain private and will only be considered, not guaranteed, as there are many factors that we have to take into account for all students and since Lexington is a smaller school, this often provides fewer options for students. Thank you for your trust in our professionalism and dedication to do what is best for all during this process.

Reminders:

- Families are encouraged to continue to use the online <u>School Screening Tool</u> that is posted on our website prior to sending their child(ren) to school each day. If your child is feeling ill, please keep them home until their symptoms improve for 24 hours, if vomiting, they need to be symptom free for 48 hours.
- Students should not be arriving prior to 9 am as we only have supervision from 9 am-9:15 am. Likewise, students must leave school property at 3:35 pm. If they would like to come back after 4:15 pm to play on the yard, they are welcome to. Prior to 4:15, the school yard may be occupied by the after school care program.
- At the beginning of the day, please drop your child(ren) off on the school side of the road to prevent them
 from having to cross the road. At the end of the day, please meet your child(ren) on the school side of the
 road to ensure their safety from buses and cars not seeing them when they cross.
- Check with your child(ren) that they have indoor footwear that fits. We often find students are starting to grow out of their footwear at this time of year.

- The Kiss n' Drop zone which is at the side of the road by the Lexington sign (same side as school) is zoned a NO PARKING area by the City of Waterloo. This is a spot to quickly drop off your child(ren) and then move. NOBODY is allowed to leave their car their for any amount of time.

Days	Days of Significance	Community	Description	
April 5-13	Pesach/Passover*	Judaism	Jewish people recall the liberation of their ancestors from slavery in ancient Egypt. It begins with a ritual meal, "Seder", where no leavened bread is consumed and is celebrated with prayers and symbolic foods. Observance begins at sunset of the previous day.	
April 6	International Asexual Visibility Day		On 6 April, people across the world will be raising awareness for International Asexuality Day. This day aims to celebrate the full asexual spectrum, focusing on four key themes: advocacy, celebration, education and solidarity.	
April 7	Good Friday*	Christianity (W)	This day commemorates the passion and death by crucifixion of Jesus Christ. Called Stelle Friedach (Quiet Friday) in Low German.	
April 8	Wesak/Vesak*	Buddhism	A Buddhist holiday that commemorates the Birth, Enlightenment, and Final Nirvana of the Buddhab. This is the most important day for Theravada Buddhists.	
			Some traditions mark the date for May 26th while others, predominantly Southeast Asian Countries, celebrate on April 8th. We have indicated both dates in this calendar.	
April 9	Easter Sunday*	Christianity (W)	This day celebrates the resurrection of Jesus from his grave. Called Oostren in Low German. Easter Sunday, Monday and Tuesday may be observed.	
April 10	Easter Monday*	Christianity (W)	Easter Monday commemorates the meeting of the women at Jesus' tomb with an angel who assured them that Jesus had been resurrected from death.	
April 12	International Day of Pink	Federal	This is a day of action for communities across the world to remain united in celebrating equity, diversity and inclusion while raising greater awareness of the need to stop homophobic, transphobic and all forms of bullying. The Day of Pink is an annual event celebrated on every second Wednesday in April.	
			Day of Pink began in Nova Scotia when two high school students intervened after witnessing a gay student in their school being bullied for wearing pink. Wanting to do more, they purchased pink shirts and distributed them throughout the school to show solidarity against homophobic and transphobic bullying.	
April 14	Vaisakhi*	Sikhism	New Year Festival. Also a commemoration of the founding of the Khalsa by Guru Gobind Singh (the tenth Sikh Guru).	
April 14	Holy Friday	Christianity (E -Orthodox)	This day commemorates the passion and death by crucifixion of Jesus Christ.	

April 15	Vishu	Hinduism	Vishu, a public holiday in the Indian state of Kerala, is the traditional new year festival of the people of the region. The date is based on a partially lunar, partially solar calendar and is the first day of the month called "Medam". Vishu is a time to spend with family at home and a time of reflection on the year behind and the year ahead. A special Vishu arrangement is made that includes specially made or collected items that are meant to be viewed first thing on the morning of the new year. These items might be flower blossoms, silver coins, rice, or anything else thought to bring good luck for the year ahead. Also on Vishu, many will eat a "Sadhya meal", which mixes all flavours together in one. The saltiness, sweetness, sour, and bitter tastes represent the varied experiences of life.
April 16	Easter/Pascha*	Christianity (E - Orthodox)	This day celebrates the resurrection of Jesus from his grave.
April 17-18	Yom HaShoah	Judaism	Holocaust Memorial Day is observed as Israel's day of commemoration for the death of 6 million Jews at the hands of the Nazi regime. Observance begins at sunset of the previous day.
April 18	Laylat-al-Qadr*	Islam	Laylat al Qadr is Arabic for "The Night of Power". It falls on one of the last ten odd nights of Ramadan and is considered the holiest night of the year as it is the night in which the Qur'an was first revealed.
April 20-21	Eid-al-Fitr*	Islam	Eid al Fitr is a Muslim holiday that marks the end of Ramadan, the Islamic holy month of Fasting. Eid is an Arabic word meaning "festivity," while Fitr means "breaking the fast". The holiday celebrates the conclusion of the 29 or 30 days of dawn-to-sunset fasting during the entire month of Ramadan. Observance begins at sunset of the previous day.
April 20- May 2	Ridvan*	Baha'i	Baha'i Ridvan commemorates the twelve days that Baha'u'llah spent in the garden of Ridvan.
April 21	Grounation Day	Rastafarian	Celebrated in honour of Emperor Haile Selassie 1 first and only visit to Jamaica in 1966. A Nyabingi session, inclusive of music, chanting and prayer is held to mark the occasion. The "Abu Ye! Abu Ye Abu ye! Abu ye!" chant is an element of Grounation Day festivities.
April 22	Earth Day	United Nations	First celebrated in 1970, Earth Day is now celebrated around the world in more than 193 countries to demonstrate support for environmental protection.
April 26	Lesbian Day of Visibility	Egale Canada, International	Beginning in 2008, this day provides a platform for lesbian role models to speak out on the issues facing female-identified sexual minorities. Alongside other queer celebration days, this day is an integral part of moving forwards to create an intersectional society where all are treated equally and fairly.
April 28	Ninth Day of Ridvan*	Baha'i	Commemorates the arrival of Baha'u'llah's family at the Ridvan garden is celebrated today as the ninth Day of Ridvan.
