theatrical lighting and sound systems are no longer working. Both systems were installed in our large gym in the early 1980's and have now been shut off for safety reasons. The theatrical lighting and sound systems are used by our music program, drama program, during assemblies, for guest speakers, our physical education program, and other special events. We are currently renting equipment so our programs can continue. The theater sound system cost is approximately \$17,000 and the stage lighting cost is approximately \$45,000. The costs are beyond our school and student activities

budgets. We will need our community's help to raise the funds to replace the systems. Donations can be made through our school website and any donation that is \$15 or greater will receive an income tax receipt. On the left side of our webpage is the "Donate Online" button which can be used to donate directly to Southwood and the lighting & sound project.



If you type into the message box your donation is for the lighting and sound system, we will add the money to that specific account. Watch in late March for a fundraising meter to show our progress towards the needed \$62,000.

Please be sure to review your child's report card with them. It is critical to ensure students are working towards the completion of their 40 community service hours. The community service hours are a graduation requirement. Aside from the 30 credits needed to graduate, the other graduation requirement is the grade 10 Literacy Test. If you child is in grade 11 or 12, please confirm they have completed the Literacy Test. If they have not completed the Literacy Test, it will be written again Thursday March 26th, 2015.

Orphan 32 by Thanh Campbell: Full School Assembly - Feb. 17

Thanh Campbell was born in Vietnam and came over to Canada as part of the last flight out of Saigon in 1975 with 56 other orphan children. Thanh was adopted into the family of Rev. William and Maureen Campbell (of Cambridge (Galt), ON). Thanh became the youngest of the six Campbell children. In the recent past, Thanh reunited with many of the children that flew over with him back in 1975 as war orphans. As the next chapter of Thanh's life is unfolding, you are invited to hear this amazing story of the value of family, life and the power of love.

Select class viewing of the film, "Colour Me." Feb. 20 and Feb. 27

"We identify others by what we see and define ourselves by the box we are trying to break out of."

"How many times have you doubted yourself?" The resounding question Colour Me encourages each of us to ask is "Who am I?"

"Motivational speaker Anthony McLean explains to a Brampton, Ontario secondary school the concept of "brand new racists". He describes that they love Black people, but if someone is not "gangsta" or "ghetto" or is educated, they regard that person as not really being Black. This comes from a scene in Sherien Barsoum's first feature documentary Colour Me.

Two years ago, Barsoum was inspired by McLean's mentorship program that asked youth what it means to be Black. As their conversations gave birth to her film, the story focused not only on the six teens, but also evolved into McLean delving into his own identity and how it related to him being half White and half Black. The film's honest snippets blend glimpses of humour with deep, internal confusion.
